

## Religious Education Curriculum Plan

By the end of studying Music at Beechwood Primary School, children will have had the opportunity to develop a mastery knowledge and an enjoyment of music. Children will be able to talk about and share their musical knowledge in the following strands:

- Singing: how to sing expressively and in unison following a conductor
- Listening: recognise different musical styles and elements such as tempo and staccato
- Composing: playing instruments, notation, improvising and composing
- Performing: create, rehearse, and evaluate performances
- Musicianship: using body percussion, instruments, and voices

All music end points will be covered using specialist music schemes: Charanga – Original Curriculum (EYFS), Charanga Model Music Curriculum (Year 1,2 and 3) and Puzzle Pieces through Accent Music Education Hub (Year 4, 5 and 6).

## **Performing**

## Composition

Playing Instruments: Rehearse and learn to play one of four differentiated instrumental parts by ear or from notation, in the tonal centres of C major, F major, G major, D major, E major, A major, D minor and F minor. Play a melody following staff notation written on one stave and using notes within an octave range (do-do); make decisions about dynamic range, including very loud (fortissimo), very quiet (pianissimo), moderately loud (mezzo forte) and moderately quiet (mezzo piano). Playing brass and woodwind instruments: Rehearse and learn to play one of four differentiated instrumental parts by ear or from notation, in the tonal centres of C major, F major, G major, D major, E major, A major, Eb major, D minor and F minor.

Notation: Explore ways of representing high and low sounds, and long and short sounds, using symbols and any appropriate means of notation. Explore standard notation, using dotted semibreves, dotted minims, minims, triplet crotchets, dotted crotchets, crotchets, dotted quavers, quavers and semiquavers, and simple combinations of: C, D, E, F, G, A, B F, G, A, B



-Understand the importance of the performing space and how to use it. -Record the performance and compare it to a previous performance. -Collect feedback from the audience and reflect how the audience believed in the performance. -Discuss how the performance might change if it was repeated in a larger/smaller performance space.

Improvising: Explore improvisation within a major scale, using the notes: C, D, E, F, G G, A, Bb, C, D G, A, B, C, D F, G, A, C, D Improvise over a groove, responding to the beat, creating a satisfying melodic shape with varied dynamics and articulation. Composing: Plan and compose an 8 or 16-beat melodic phrase, using the pentatonic scale (eq C, D, E, G, A), and incorporate rhythmic variety and interest. Play this melody on available tuned percussion and/or orchestral instruments. Notate this melody. Either of these melodies can be enhanced with rhythmic or simple chordal accompaniment. Create a simple chord progression. Compose a ternary (ABA form) piece; use available music software/apps to create and record it, discussing how musical contrasts are achieved. Create music in response to music and video stimulus. Use music technology, if available, to capture, change and combine sounds. Start to use structures within compositions, eq introduction, multiple verse and chorus sections, AB form or ABA form (ternary form). Use simple dynamics. Use rhythmic variety. Compose song accompaniments, perhaps using basic chords. Use a wider range of dynamics, including fortissimo (very loud), pianissimo (very quiet), mezzo forte (moderately loud) and mezzo piano (moderately quiet). Use full scales in different keys. Create a melody using crotchets, guavers and minims, and perhaps semibreves and semiguavers, and all equivalent rests. Use a pentatonic and a full scale. Use major and minor tonality: C, D C, D, E C, D, E, F C, D, E, F, G Start and end on the note C (C major) G, A G, A, B G, A, B, D G, A, B, D, E Start and end on the note G (Pentatonic on G) D, E D, E, F D, E, F, G D, E, F, G, D, E, F, D, E, A Start and end on the note D (D minor) F, G F, G, A, C F, G, A, C, D Start and end on the note F (Pentatonic on F) F, G F, G, Ab F, G, Ab, Bb F, G, Ab, Bb, C Start and end on the note F (F minor)
